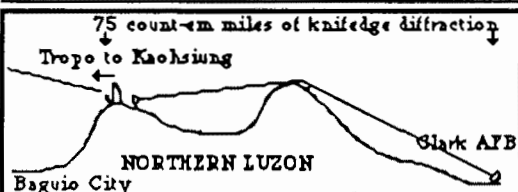
**PW SUPPORT....**

With the coming of the 20th anniversary of Tet, I am thinking back to those days with horror and amusement. We all remember the former, the latter is the subject of this story.

During the 1967 Christmas season, everyone was having a party. Too many. My running mate, Tony Zappa, suggested that rather than add to the clutter by each of us having our own big bash, we should team up and have a mini-bash just for an hour or so every evening at his place, which was just a block from the Tran Quan Khai Office. My house was right around the corner. So we announced it as *cocktails after work throughout the holidays*. Most nights, or at least those nights that Tony survived the cocktails, we put on a simple (some said chaotic) feed of pasta and salad.

Christmas came and went, as did New Year; but by then, many were in the habit of stopping by Tony's nightly. So the party went on and on. Toward the end of January, both Tony and I were getting weary of it all and began to discourage the drop-ins. As Tet approached, they had tapered off but had not stopped.

Tet eve, Tony and I hosted a dinner at a downtown restaurant for my procurement gang which consisted mainly of Vietnamese, Philippino(a)s and Koreans. The Vietnamese had all heard rumblings of some trouble being afoot. We decided to forgo our planned foray to the Tu Do nightclub and broke up the party.

Tony and I took advantage of the early hour and stopped by the Flamingo North on the way home. After a few drinks and good cheer with other Pageneers, we made our selections and went to our respective houses.

Throughout the night we heard scary noises. She said it was firecrackers. I knew it was small arms and either rockets, grenades, mortars, or all of the above.

In the morning, just as she was leaving, there was

a great hubbub in the communal courtyard. Some women were shrieking. One dropped an infant over the wall which the other was to catch but did not. It was about a five-foot drop.

More out of curiosity than dedication, I decided to walk to the office. My alley was a mess, just littered with cartridge casings and pock marks. As I turned onto Tran Quan Khai I saw ARVN and White Mice everywhere. They wore civilian clothes, pajamas, and whatall, with only bits and pieces of uniforms. They looked like Pancho Villa's guerrillas. Concertina barriers were everywhere. I could see that our corner police station had been hit.

When I reached the office, a few dozen Pageneers were standing outside swapping stories. Eventually we started drifting into the building. It was soon learned that our erstwhile Indian security guards had disappeared. Doug Carter reasoned that in their absence the VC may have seeded the building. So he ordered that we evacuate.

Once again the large group was milling about on the sidewalk. A Korean tech started to walk across the street. A White Mouse screamed at him to get back on the sidewalk but the Dai Han did not understand. The Mouse shot him in the foot.

Several of us tried to get permission to carry the guy across the street to the little maternity hospital. After much arguing we got him across only to be rejected by the nurse because the hospital's expertise was limited to babysans.

Right about this time, Tony Zappa came striding down the street with a look on his face that said, "What the hell is going on here?" He was told about the panicky Mouse and made a move to get at him. The Mouse screamed at Tony and pointed his carbine at him, not at his foot but at his unmissable mid-section.

After some more shouting, Tony realized the futility of redressing that situation, so he turned to other priorities. He sort of took charge and announced that it was unlikely that we would go to work today or for several days, so why didn't we all go to his place for a cup of coffee, listen to the armed

forces radio, and discuss the situation.
